Main Campus: The 236-acre campus is bounded on the east by the Orange Freeway (Route 57), the south by Nutwood Avenue, the west by State College Boulevard and the north by Yorba Linda Blvd.

History: Founded in 1957 by act of the California Legislature. Classes began in fall 1959 in facilities leased from the Fullerton Union High School District. First commencement held June 1960. Classes on the permanent site of the main campus began in fall 1960.

Governance: The university is subject to policies established by the California Legislature and the California State University Board of Trustees. Campus governance is the responsibility of the President. The Academic Senate develops policy on curriculum, academic standards, criteria and standards for faculty performance and other matters that, if approved by the President, become university policy (John W. Bedell, chair).

Statistics:

- 36,156 enrolled in fall 2011 (57% female); 34,912 enrolled in spring 2011 (57% female); 35,590 enrolled in fall 2010 (58% female); 32,611 enrolled in spring 2010 (58% female); 36,262 in fall 2009 (58% female); 37,765 in spring 2009; 36,996 in fall 2008 (59% female).
- Average age: 24 years. Median age: 22.
- International students from 80 nations, total 1,075 (fall 2011).
- Ethnic distribution of student body (fall 2011 census): American Indian 0.29%, Asian/Pacific Islander 22%, Black 3%, Hispanic 32%, White 30%, Multiple Race Non-Hispanic 3%, Unknown 6% and International Students 4%. (Total exceeds 100%, due to rounding).
- Overall 2011-12 budget: \$432.5 million.
- 1,800 full- and part-time instructional faculty members (approx.)
- More than 208,600 graduates as of August 2011.
- Faculty members were awarded \$26.6 million in grants and contracts for research and scholarly activities in 2010-2011.

Economic Impact: The CSU 2010 study "Working for California: The Impact of the California State University" notes that Cal State Fullerton generates \$1 billion in economic activity annually, sustains more than 8,700 jobs in the region and generates more than \$65 million per year in state tax revenue.

Accreditations: CSUF has national accreditations in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, communicative disorders, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, public health, social work, teacher education and theater; and overall accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

The university's instructional program is offered by eight colleges; their deans are:

The academic calendar for regularly enrolled students includes fall and spring semesters, plus summer session. Classes are offered on the main campus, the CSUF Irvine Campus — a branch campus, where Susan M. Cooper is dean — and online. In addition, extension courses are offered throughout the year by University Extended Education, (Harry L. Norman, dean) which is also responsible for summer session and for Intersession.

Other Offerings: Numerous credential and certificate programs.

Cost: CSU Trustees set the tuition fees charged to all enrolled in the regular program. The campus sets additional fees. Nonresidents of California pay these costs plus higher tuition. Per legislation, tuition fees differ for undergraduate and graduate students. In 2009, the CSU instituted a professional fee for state-supported MBA and similar business graduate programs. Doctoral students pay a higher tuition fee, on a par with those attending the University of California.

- For the fall 2011 semester, full-time undergraduates pay \$3,064 in overall tuition and fees. Those enrolled in six or fewer units pay \$1,915.
- Overall graduate tuition and fees are \$3,697 per semester for seven or more units and \$2,281 for six or fewer units. Graduate students in the Mihaylo College of Business and Economics are assessed additional tuition fees of \$254 per unit.
- Overall tuition and fees for those enrolled in credential programs are \$3,502 for seven units or above and \$2,170 for six units or less. Total tuition and fees for the doctoral program are \$5,578 per semester.
- Nonresident and international students pay basic tuition and fees required of California residents plus \$372 per unit per semester. Such a student enrolled in 15 units in fall 2011, therefore, is charged \$8,644 (undergraduate) or \$9,277 (graduate) for a semester of study.
- Tuition and fees vary by program for students enrolled in fall, spring and summer extension courses and Intersession.

National Rankings: *U.S. News & World Report* (September 2011) ranks CSUF among “Top Public Universities,” (No. 6 among Top Public Universities-Master’s institutions in the West).

Diverse Issues in Higher Education (June 2011) ranks CSUF ninth in the nation in terms of baccalaureate degrees awarded to minority students, based on data from the U.S. Department of Education.

Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education (May 2011) ranks CSUF No. 1 in California and fifth in the nation among top colleges and universities awarding bachelor’s degrees to Hispanics, based on 2010 data from the U.S. Department of Education.

The Steven G. Mihaylo College of Business and Economics, the state’s largest accredited business college, is included in the 2011 edition of Princeton Review’s *Best 300 Business Schools*.

The Templeton Guide: Colleges That Encourage Character Development lists CSUF’s Student Leadership Institute among “Exemplary Programs” in the student leadership category.

Facilities: The main campus consists of 29 permanent buildings or building clusters. The latest addition is the new student housing and dining complex east of the Ruby Gerontology Center. Five new residence halls house 1,084 students. The Gastronome dining hall seats 585. Other recent additions include the Children’s Center, the Student Recreation Center, Steven G. Mihaylo Hall and the University Police and Emergency Operations Center. Other major campus structures include the Joseph Clayes III Performing Arts Center, Paulina June & George Pollak Library, Titan Student Union — which has a 1,200-seat events pavilion, small theater, food court, pub, bowling alley and conference rooms.

A wing added to the Kinesiology and Health Science Building in 2003 includes the Center for Successful Aging. The Charles L. and Rachel E. Ruby Gerontology Center is home to the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute. The 10-story College Park building on Nutwood Avenue houses the College of Communications and College of Education, and also provides additional classrooms and office space for staff and faculty.

Three parking structures — completed in 2004, 2006 and 2010 — provide on-campus parking for about 5,500 vehicles, expanding the overall number of campus parking spaces to more than 11,300.

Branch Campus and Other Satellites: The CSUF Irvine Campus near the Irvine Spectrum offers mostly upper-division and graduate-level courses in a convenient location for students who live and work in southern Orange County. Other campus satellites include the Grand Central Art Center in Santa Ana and CSUF Garden Grove Center.

Fullerton Arboretum: The Fullerton Arboretum, developed in cooperation with the city of Fullerton, is located at the northeast corner of campus and is open to the public. Heritage House, built in 1894 and moved to the 26-acre preserve in 1972, is a historical museum. A visitor and conference center includes a museum devoted to the agricultural history of Orange County and the contributions of Japanese-Americans.

Fullerton Marriott: A full-service hotel opened in 1989 on the southeast corner of the main campus in a project involving the Marriott Corp., the city of Fullerton and the university.

Titan Sports Complex: Revenue from the hotel venture was used to establish the Titan Sports Complex in 1992, featuring Titan Stadium (10,000 seats), Goodwin Field (3,500 seats), Anderson Field for softball, a track and full-sized soccer field.

Intercollegiate Athletics: Men’s programs are NCAA Division I baseball (2004, 1995, 1984 and 1979 national championships), basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, and track and field. Division I women’s sports are basketball, cross country, golf, indoor and outdoor track and field, soccer, softball (1986 national championship), tennis and volleyball.

Mascot: The choice of the elephant as the university’s mascot, dubbed Tuffy Titan, dates to the early 1960s when the campus hosted “The First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History.” The May 11 event attracted 10,000 spectators, 15 racing pachyderms, and worldwide news coverage.

Cultural Events: The College of the Arts presents a wide variety of cultural attractions showcasing student and faculty talent, and guest artists. Associated Students Productions events include noon concerts in Becker Amphitheater, singers and comedians in The Pub and celebrity performers in Portola Pavilion.

Philanthropy: The Cal State Fullerton Philanthropic Foundation oversees the management of philanthropic gifts to the university. Its Board of Governors focuses its expertise, oversight and advocacy on enhancing private support for California State University, Fullerton.

Support Groups: CSUF maintains a large network of support groups. These include: the President’s Associates, the CSUF Alumni Association, the Art Alliance, Colleagues of the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics, the Emeriti, Friends of the Fullerton Arboretum, the MAMM Alliance for the Performing Arts, Music Associates, the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, Patrons of the Library, the Association of the Friends and Docents of the Anthropology Museum, the Reading Educators Guild, Titan Advocates and Titan Athletic Club.

Parking: University parking is self-supported by fees charged to all students, faculty and staff members. Visitor parking is available for a daily fee of \$8. Thirty-minute visitor parking is free in designated areas. Parking is free on weekends. Special-event parking fees of \$8 are charged for all home baseball and men’s basketball games.
